SWISS (with CHEESE) By Lil Range

{Note to readers: This column may not be for the lactose intolerant.} Swiss is an un-Brie-lievably fun form of bridge, and it is unique in that it involves 4-person teams, rather than the 2-person pairs involved in duplicate. If you want to join the fun, read this article to find out how to be the big cheese, or at least on the same charcuterie board.

The first step in playing Swiss is to form a team. Face-to-face, you would form this team pairing up with 3 other cheeses. You might invite them, or they might invite you. Online, you would form this team by first registering with your partner in the same way you register in a pairs event. Then you (paired up with your partner) join with your teammates.

Some people find this second online step confusing, if this happens to you, don't cheese it! In BBO, use the SELECT TEAMMATES button to join with teammates. Once you register with your partner, you and your partner will appear under the SELECT TEAMMATES list. Likewise, when your teammates register, they too will appear in the SELECT TEAMMATES list. Say Monterey Jack and Feta are planning to play with Cottage and Camembert. Monterey Jack registers with Feta, and Cottage registers with Camembert. The SELECT TEAMMATES will include the Monterey Jack and Feta pair, as well as the Cottage and Camembert pair. The SELECT TEAMMATES will probably have other cheeses as well, so watch which gouda you join up with. Online, either pair can invite the other pair. Invite by clicking on the blue INVITE box beside the name of your teammates. So, Monterey Jack (already paired with Feta) can invite the Cottage and Camembert, or Cottage (already paired with Camembert) can invite the Monterey Jack and Feta. Once one pair invites and the other accepts, all four names move to ENTRIES and (say Cheese!), the team is set to go.

Occasionally, people accept invitations from a pair that is not the pair they planned to join. For example, Monterey Jack and Feta might accidentally agree to play with Cream and Cheddar, now they have the wrong cheese! In this case, the ENTRIES list will include a team that is Monterey Jack, Feta, Cream, and Cheddar. Oops! To get the right cheese, use the DEREGISTER button (look for the word DEREGISTER near where the REGISTER button used to be) and then REGISTER again. Any of the 4 cheeses can deregister. A good guideline is to check which cheese is inviting you to make sure it is the cheese you were expecting. If you cannot navigate the system in Sunday Swiss don't be Blue! Call Lil (504 330 1158). It is tricky the first time, but you will get used to it. If you are registered with a partner, you will get to play, even if you don't have teammates when the game starts. Two cheeses are enough to make fondue.

One problem that can happen is that you find yourself without the 4 people to make a full team. Online, there is no reason for the cheese to stand alone! Call Lil (504 330 1158) or Dave (419 575 4513), who will line you up with a partner and/or teammates. There is an online Swiss team event every Sunday at 2, and every Thursday at 6:50. Swiss is growing! The online Sunday game reached 50 tables recently. Join in, we are aiming for 60 tables!

MENTORS - MY HEROES

Most often in a successful program within an organization there are people who never get "their due". The management glows in the benefits of the program. The program's director receives praises and is encouraged to continue her program. And such is the case for me and BEGINNER BRIDGE. I have three years of Beginner Bridge classes under my belt and close to 200 students have participated including those who felt better repeating the class. It is a great challenge to teach this game to a room full of students whose experience with the game run the gambit from never having played to having played years ago in college or having played rubber bridge with friends. To address all the issues and all the questions is quite a task. Especially when they go to the tables to play. With 25 students I would need to help players at 6 tables at one time. IMPOSSIBLE!!

Because of that task, I rely heavily on MENTORS. Mentors are players from the club who come and help at each table as these beginners play bridge. They help the students learn the mechanics of the game like how to use the bid box or how to move from table to table. They help while the students are playing, answering questions about bidding and play. They also serve as great encouragers and motivators by sharing their experiences – both good and bad.

These mentors are the real heroes! Without them I think my drop out ratio would be quite high because I could not address all the questions and situations that come up. I have had mentors with as few as 20 masterpoints and grand masters with over 10,000 masterpoints. All have been the key to the success of this program. I thank them for the gift of their time and knowledge both to the students and to me. Most have said that they got a "good, good feeling down in their soul" as they helped others learn our game. I am blessed to have had help from each one of them. I have a special shoutout to **Maureen Richoux** who has valiantly helped coordinate the mentors who come and help, making sure each week we had enough mentors at each session. She stands in whenever we run short; a couple of times she even filled in for both the morning and evening session.

There are two teaching adages that I lean on:

- WHEN YOU TEACH YOU LEARN AS WELL. And in the context of bridge, I am still a student as much as a teacher. So, it's a win-win for me. I learn when reading bridge books looking for material and better ways to present it. I learn as I develop the lessons. I learn new ways of looking at things when I interact with students and get their view of a problem or situation. And I learn by strengthening that memory muscle every time I say out loud: "This bid says..."
- TWO HANDS ARE BETTER THAN ONE. The work is more easily accomplished, the burden is lightened, and the goals become attainable. I have never thought teaching should be a sole endeavor. Without MENTORS we could not have accomplished what we did with these students. I do love this game and love that I get to share what I know about it. Mentors make my time teaching a joy and not a duty.

Oh, by the way, I will certainly need Mentors with future classes. So don't be surprised if Maureen and I come knocking for help. Just one time in 12 weeks would be a big help in either the morning or evening session. And there's nothing like the great feeling of being a HERO.
