

Conventional Wisdom

This is the first of a series of columns on filling out a convention card. Let's start with the basics. Every partnership is supposed to have an identically-filled-out convention card.

- In **online games**, this is accomplished by logging in to BBO, clicking on the **ACCOUNT** tab along the right-hand side, clicking on the **CONVENTION CARDS** tab along the top, clicking on **NEW ACBL CONVENTION CARD**, and then filling it out. In the **PARTNER** slot, type your partner's BBO username. Now, whenever you play in an online game, your card will be easily accessible by everyone at your table.
- In **club games**, you and your partner need to fill out an identical paper version of this convention card. You will find a stack of blank convention cards at the club on the table beside the game director's desk. You should always make your filled-out convention card easily accessible to your opponents during every game.

ANNOUNCEABLE BIDS

"Announceable" means somebody has to say something when an announceable bid has been made. You can know a bid is announceable because it is coloured blue on both the online and paper convention cards. There are only four announceable bids.

One No Trump Opening Bid

A typical announcement would be "15 to 17"

Transfer Bids

A typical announcement would be "spades"

One Club Opening Bid

A typical announcement would be "could be short"

One No Trump Response

A typical announcement would be "forcing"

It is important to note that when you're playing **online**, the person who makes the announceable bid is the same person who has to make the announcement. This is done by typing the announcement on the line underneath the bidding box. The partner of the person who makes an announceable bid does not see his partner's announcement, but the opponents both do.

In club games, it's the *partner* of the person who makes an announceable bid who must make the announcement. Furthermore, the person who made the announceable bid must act as if he didn't hear his partner's announcement (ethically he must not be "woken up" by his partner's announcement if it turns out that they are on different pages).

When the Sharks are Away....



RED MASTER POINTS on Sunday, February 11 **– BOTH on BBO and at OUR CLUB**

Sunday, February 11 is **RED POINT DAY** (50% black and 50% red) for all sanctioned BBO games at virtual clubs. Also, clubs are allowed to designate a F2F game to reward red points, so GRBC did just that.

On Sunday, February 11, GRBC has three games in which you can earn red points. At 10:00 am, we have two online BBO games (499 and Open), and at 1:00 pm we have a F2F 499 game at our club - all games rewarding 50% red points. (If none of these options works for you, consider SE Carolina games on BBO at 9:30 am, 1:00 pm, and 7:00 pm.)

Our GRBC games, both at our club and on BBO, have just a \$1 surcharge – a very good deal for RED POINTS! So don't miss this opportunity to get a few more red points into your bridge purse - playing at the club or playing online - or both!

Small Acts of Kindness and of Love

Here are a few things that individual players can do to show consideration to their fellow players and volunteers.

- Arrive at least 15 minutes before game time. If everyone would do this, it would give the Director some much-appreciated breathing room.

- Clean up your coffee spills and crumbs and dispose of all the dirty crockery and other assorted debris at your table before you head for home. It's the maid's day off.





The Answer Lady

As the "The Answer Lady" I have been responding to questions from "newer" players over the past several weeks. A request has been made to share those players' questions and my responses in the Alert, essentially a column for the beginner player! You can write to me at suzan2420@yahoo.ca.

Last week a reader posed several questions after opponents opened 1NT showing 15-17 HCPs and Responder bid 2♣, with only four HCPs and a five-card heart suit. The column provided guidance on Responder's bidding choices using a Jacoby transfer. The reader asked additional questions related to that 2♣ Stayman convention bid.

Questions

When using the Stayman convention, is it all about shape? When do points count? Don't you need at least eight or nine HCPs to use Stayman?

Answers

Like the Jacoby transfer outlined in last week's column, both points and shape play a role in any Stayman Convention bid. Unlike the Jacoby transfer, Responder is showing a minimum of eight HCPs. That point count is critical, as it commits the partnership to playing at least as high as 2NT. There is no similar point count requirement for Jacoby transfers. Stayman allows players to find a four-four major suit fit after a 1NT opening bid. Major suits usually play better than NT when the partnership has at least an eight-card fit.

Barbara Seagram and Marc Smith in *25 Conventions You Should Know*, 1999, pp.13-20 outline the requirements for a Stayman convention bid. Responder needs:

"8+ HCP, i.e. at least invitational points + 1 or more 4 card majors + shortness in one suit (you would not use Stayman with a 4-3-3-3 shaped hand)."

Opener has three response choices after Responder's 2♣ bid:

1. 2♦ = I do not have a four-card major;
2. 2♥ = I have a four-card heart suit and *may* have a four-card spade suit; and
3. 2♠ = I have a four-card spade suit, but I do not have a four-card heart suit.


Note that with both four-card majors, Opener bids up the line, mentioning their four-card heart suit before any four-card spade suit. After Opener's bid, Responder can now bid based on their point count and any fit with Opener's major suit. With invitational values (8-9 HCPs) and a four-card fit, Responder will bid either 3♥ or 3♠. With no four-card major fit, Responder will bid 2NT. With game-going values, Responder will bid either 4♥ or 4♠ with a four-card major fit and 3NT with no four-card fit.

In the latter case (when Responder has bid game), Opener will pass. In the former case, (after Responder's invitational 2NT, 3♥ or 3♠ bid), Opener will pass with minimum values but bid game in one of 3NT or 4♥ or 4♠ with maximum values. If Responder bids 2NT or 3NT after Opener's 2♥ bid, Opener knows that Responder's four-card suit is not hearts but spades and may correct by bidding 3♠ or 4♠ with four spades in their hand. Such is the intricate communication available using the Stayman Convention.

Killing Me Softly with his Bid

East has a happy problem after North opens the bidding – one of his two majors has been eliminated and North has the lion’s share of the remaining HCP. He makes a reasonable take-out double, planning to bid some number of NT after his partner chooses a minor. He is thrilled that partner has four spades (oops) and rightly decides to only bid a strong invitational 3♠, which his partner quickly rejects. West wins the opening spade lead with the queen and tries a heart, even though the opponents can negotiate a ruff or two, because he has no other source of tricks. Many defenders would grab their ace, but that would give declarer three heart tricks if he started with only one or two hearts. After winning a heart trick, declarer drew all the outstanding trumps from South and now had to play the rest of the hand from dummy. ♦K, 4, 5, A -- ♦3, 8, Q, 10 -- ♦6, J, ♣9, ♣6. Below is what’s left.

If West leads a heart, North grabs the ace and leads another heart, making declarer lead away from the ♠K. If he instead leads a club, once again he is endplayed when North wins the ace and leads another club to dummy. Whether or not you followed this rather complicated retelling of the play, there are two issues to remember for future reference. More often than you might imagine, grabbing a winner “before it gets away” will often cost you two tricks when declarer easily sets up the suit. The other point is West’s response to his partner’s take-out double. Sometimes you have to bid a three-card suit because you have 4333 distribution, with your four-card suit being opener’s suit. It is frequently better to bid a minor rather than lie about the other major because bidding the major excites partner too much. Bidding 2♣ will probably elicit a 2NT bid.
