CPR and AED Training







The Answer Lady

As the "The Answer Lady" I have been responding to questions from "newer" players over the past several weeks. A request has been made to share those players' questions and my responses in the Alert, essentially a column for the beginner player! You can write to me at suzan2420@yahoo.ca.

Question

Answer Lady, would you please help my partner and me bid this hand? I was sitting East and my partner, with 16 HCPs, opened the bidding with 1NT. North overcalled 2♠, a natural bid showing a spade suit. I had nine HCP's but was unsure what to do. Without North's interfering bid, I would have used Stayman to show at least eight or nine HCPs and a four-card major suit, but with that 2♠ bid I didn't know what to do so decided to pass. We ended up putting the opponents down one, but my partner felt I should have bid something. What is the best way to handle this hand, Answer Lady?

Answer

That 2♠ overcall certainly put pressure on you in Responder's seat. Of course, that's exactly what it was intended to do. You can't use Stayman now to show those four hearts and you can't bid 2NT with a singleton spade. What you do have however is points - nine to be exact - and your partner has 16. So together you have 25 HCPs, more than the opponents and, in the best-case scenario, sufficient for game. However, it's difficult to find game after that overcall, especially with a singleton spade in your hand and only one sketchy spade stopper in West's hand.

This hand came from a GRBC 299 F2F game so we can't see the bidding. I was able to review the results online for all pairs. One frisky pair actually got to 5♣ and made it. Another pair sitting N/S made the 2♠. Your result of 2♠ going down one wasn't the worst score. Some tried NT, unsuccessfully I might add. It's not a great option, for the reasons listed above.

I think you need some type of strategy or approach to deal with 1NT interference. There are several options out there (most notably lebensohl), but most require a great deal of work and memory capacity. Way back a long time ago, in the July 18, 2022 Alert, I provided a basic strategy using Larry Cohen's simple guidelines for dealing with NT interference. I am attaching the link below. The July 18, 2022 article had this even more barebones approach.

1. If the interference is double or 2♣, just ignore the interference and bid whatever you would have bid without the interference. If you double the 2♣ interference, that would be Stayman, a stolen bid double. Most open players at our club play this way.
2. If the interference is 2♦ or higher, just ignore the interference and bid naturally. A double would show values but no clear-cut bid.

Using Larry's approach, you would double here - essentially a negative double. It tells partner that you have tolerance for the other suits, but that you can't bid no trump because you don't have a stopper in spades. It also tells your partner that you have some points and that you think that the hand belongs to your side (that is, you or your partner should be either declaring the contract or else doubling the opponents).

Your partner can decide where to best place the contract. West doesn't have four hearts so can't bid hearts, and with just one stopper in spades not a great fit for NT either. West would likely make a decision around playing this hand in a minor - clubs or diamonds. You would likely pass that bid with your minimal values.

Player Profile – Nanci Phelan

If you're ever needing a shot of enthusiasm for your bridge habit, look no further than this week's passionate profilee, Nanci Phelan!

Nanci fell into bridge by accident. It was the days of women's lib, so she and a girlfriend tried to sign up for a fix-your-own-car night school course. Sadly, that class was full but bridge had openings and, needing a night out they signed up, knowing only that it was a game played by snobby rich people.

The instructor was bad, and the class was a disaster. But Nanci's husband, Arthur came too and they connected with another couple who were also pregnant. Playing bridge then became a life-line while she was home raising children, later with work friends, and finally as a way to feel empowered and do something she was actually better at than her husband!!

While the Phelan family lived a back-to-the land-lifestyle in Tweed, building their own passive solar home and growing vegetables, Nanci got a job organizing night school classes for Loyalist College. The more classes she got going, the more she got paid. So, with a hippie friend who was keen on the game, they decided to teach bridge to seniors. This instilled a love of teaching bridge that continued when the family moved to Ottawa, Brockville, and then Elmira 18 years ago.

Nanci delights in "giving the gift of bridge". Her students in KW have morphed into a "club" of 55 women who play weekly bridge, but also enjoy birthdays, seasonal parties, and cottage getaways - female bonding at its best. Nanci plays duplicate several times a week but also runs two other social bridge groups where friendships flourish. Her six years with GRBC, along with the opportunities presented by BBO, have turned bridge into more of a personal addiction.


Originally from Peterborough, Nanci graduated from Western University with plans to teach high school English, but there was a surplus of teachers at that time, so she remained home with her children doing daycare while they were young. Later, she had a variety of different jobs, from teacher's aid to supply teacher to administrative assistant.

Nanci and Arthur will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary this year. Sadly, none of their three children will even try to learn bridge. Recently she enticed one of her six grandchildren to spare at the weekly Tuesday Discussion Bridge game. He was much adored by the little old ladies. Hope springs eternal.

Nanci has served on the executive of other clubs such as: Probus, Newcomers, and the Canadian Federation of University Women (organizing bridge groups there as well). Her father instilled a love of sports. Their Kawartha Lake cottage was a playground for swimming, waterskiing, trampolining, ski-Dooing, and playing tennis which continues as another love, though aging has diminished that competitive edge.

And bridge isn't her only passion - over 40 years ago, another looking-for-a-night-out class produced a stained-glass artist at large. Nanci has a home business called Hooked on Glass, and she teaches classes in order to "share the gift of stained glass". 


Real Precision



This is one possible route to the easy-to-play grand slam. Neither the heart opening bid nor the subsequent heart cuebid were enough to encourage South to keep going with his minimum points and two losers in clubs. Subsequent bids got him back in the game.

This auction presents a different path to the optimum spot, requiring partner to have a different level of trust. South signed off in 4♠ because of his two losing clubs. When partner persisted with 5♣, three more cuebids followed. As a rule, if your partnership has enough stuff to cuebid four times, you should be in the slam you were trying to get to, in this case 7♠. North had to trust that her partner had the ♠AQ and the ♦A for his bidding. Even if he had one fewer spade, 13 tricks would be easy.

Kudos to Jennifer Verdam and Dave Longstaff on this hand. Damn you both for doing it to me.
