




The Answer Lady

As the "The Answer Lady" I have been responding to questions from "newer" players over the past several weeks. A request has been made to share those players' questions and my responses in the Alert, essentially a column for the beginner player! You can write to me at <u>suzan2420@yahoo.ca</u>.

When partner opens with a weak two bid, Responder has a number of choices. With support for partner's suit, Responder determines where best to place the contract in that suit. Last week's column provided the option when Responder has trump support and a strong hand. Game is a good possibility and Responder can apply Mel's Rule of 17 in making that decision.



Responder would comfortably bid directly to 4 with the following hand - Q974 AKQ7 6 KQ85 - after Opener bids 2 . Responder has Mel's Rule of 17.

On other occasions, Responder has support for Opener's suit but doesn't have enough points to meet the threshold for Mel's Rule, namely Responder has 16 or less Mel's points. Let's say Opener begins the bidding in first seat with 2 and Responder's hand looks like this: Q9752 A5 76542 52.

What to do after the opponent on Responder's right passes? Clearly, Responder's weak hand with only six HCPs doesn't meet the requirements for Mel's Rule of 17. What Responder does have is five spades, (really *excellent* trump support) matching up with Opener's six spades. Barbara Seagram in *Beginning Bridge, 2008, pp184-185,* suggests an immediate bid of 4 despite that weak hand. In all likelihood, the opponent on Responder's left has a good hand with the potential to find a game and possibly even a slam. If Responder immediately bids 4 , the opponents won't know whether Responder has the Rule of 17 or is bidding on to make their life difficult. This strategy can be especially effective when opponents are vulnerable and you are not vulnerable.

You and your partner are not expecting to make this contract of 4 with potentially only 12-16 HCPs between you, possibly scoring -100 or even -300. But that would be a better score than the opponents' score of 420 (non-vulnerable) or 620 (vulnerable) if they have a game.

Pre-Emptive (Weak) Twos – Including the Responses

Pre-emptive bids are a great way to disrupt your opponents' bidding - and often land you in a good contract of your own. This two-part module focuses on weak two bids.

It covers when to open a weak two and when to make a different bid, overcalling with a weak two, and partner's responses to a weak two bid. Many examples will be given.



What's Goin' On?

Sometimes partner's bids ask you a specific question and your answer is an unqualified yes. Then partner goes in an entirely different direction. What the heck is going on?



South opens 1♠, North bids 2♦ (natural two over one game force), and East (the troublemaker) bids 2♥. Many players would just jump to 4♠ and be done with it, but this particular South is made of sterner stuff. He bids 3♥, ostensibly asking for a heart stopper. So North bids 3NT, saying "Yep – I got that". Now South bids 4♠. What's going on when partner asks you for a stopper for NT and you reply in the affirmative, and then he pulls 3NT to four of his suit? He is saying that his hand is too good just to jump to game in his own suit.

So, partner is looking for a spade slam. What are your negatives? You have only one spade, but partner doesn't seem to care about your spade holding and your jack is an honour. What are your positives? Three aces. I say again: THREE ACES! How often do you face a partner who is trying for slam opposite a hand which didn't promise a ton of high-card points and you have THREE ACES! Indeed, your spade jack now seems to be a positive and your diamonds and hearts are added value. Jump to 6.

At our table, North bid 5♣ over 4♠, but South had too many worries to proceed beyond 5♠ and North thought long and hard but passed. If the ♦K had been onside, declarer would have made 13 tricks.

All of the spade game bidders got 30%. Two pairs did better in 3NT making 12 tricks, and only one pair bid 6♠.

- For both online and f2f games, log on to <u>Pianola</u>, click on Partner Finder, and create a Partner Finder advert. This needs to be done at least a few hours in advance of the game. When you use Partner Finder, it will allow folks to see your contact information. If you have posted a Partner Finder ad, kindly remember to check your phone and email and, when you've found a partner, delete your ad. Someone who replied to your ad may be waiting for a response.
- For online games only, log in to the game in question and register yourself on the Partnership Desk tab (or look to see if someone else has already registered there).

If you are looking for a regular partner, contact <u>Joan Slover</u>, our membership lead. Please let her know what sort of game/partner you are interested in – your playing level, your available time slots, F2F and/or online, and any other pertinent information.
