## K Q 94 Partner opened 1 s . You made a simple raise to 2 S . You have a full 9 points and four good <br> Q 97 trumps but not quite enough to raise 1 S to 3 S (your hand is very flat, no ruffing potential)

## \$AK 10764 You have 18 points and six good Spades. After opening 15 your rebid should be $3 S$ (not <br> A 106 <br> A J <br> Q 9

You've done really well to get to 6 S. There are six Spade tricks, two Heart ruffs, two Diamonds and one Club. Only 11 tricks!

The Diamond suit has a great chance for the $12^{\text {th }}$ trick. You should take the finesse. This means leading up to the Jack. You instead lead the Jack. This is a 'no-win play', as you don't have the Ten. Even if West had the Queen of Diamonds they would cover your Jack and you still only win your Ace-King of Diamonds.

Another option (which would have worked here) is to play Ace of Clubs, then ruff two Clubs in hand, hoping that the King of Clubs falls. Then the Queen is your $12^{\text {th }}$ trick. For the best chance of 65 you should try for the Clubs first, then if it fails fall back on the Diamond finesse.

You were defending. Michael made a great switch to the King of Clubs. You correctly encouraged by throwing the 9 of Clubs. It didn't matter here, but on another hand that would be the key to letting him know to continue Clubs later.
