Registration is now Open for COPC and CIPC

Our premiere pair events, the Canadian Open Pairs Championship (June 4 & 5) and the Canadian IMP Pairs Championship (June 11 & 12) will be played on BBO. Pairs must register on our website, as registration will not be available on BBO. The registration deadline is **May 31** for the COPC and June 7 for the CIPC. Register now

The cost is \$80 per pair per day. Pairs who qualify for the second day will pay for day 2 on our website when they find out they qualified.

Prizes for the COPC and CIPC are in the form of CBF Credits which can be used for entries to CBF events. Your entry fees will be refunded and the remainder will be awarded as CBF credits.

1st Place: 1st place pair receives \$1,000 CBF credit 2nd Place: 2nd place pair receives \$700 CBF credit 3rd Place: 3rd place pair receives \$300 CBF credit

The entry fees will be refunded and the pair will split the remainder as credits towards future CBC or CBF Online Team League entries.

In Case You Have Forgotten...

(This is the second in a series about etiquette and protocol at the bridge table)

Play of the Hand

Say 'thank you' to your partner when he/she puts the dummy on the table.

You, as the opening leader, may ask for any review of the bidding, before you make your opening lead. Remember to lead by laying the card face down on the table and **then** write the contract on your scoresheet. This prevents irregularities such as leading out of turn. After the initial face down lead, all players, except dummy, may request a review of the auction and an explanation of any alerted calls.

If you are sitting in the north seat, lead first **before** entering the contract into the Bridgemates.

Other players may ask for a review of the auction at their first opportunity to play.

Do not SNAP your cards down on the table. This can damage the cards which can, in turn, affect the functioning of the automated card dealer.

Do not detach a card from your hand before it is your turn to play.

Do not pull up a card, push it back into your hand and then pull up another card.

Never rearrange your hand when you are out of a suit. This will provide additional information to your opponents and your partner.

You have the right to inspect the cards that have been played on the current trick as long as your card remains face up. Once all cards have been turned over (facedown) no one can ask to see the cards that were played.

At the end of a hand, ensure that you do not gather up your cards until the result is agreed upon with the opponents.

North, before entering the result into Bridgemates, you must present it to East/West for their acceptance.

Do not look at your opponent's or partner's cards after the hand has been played without their permission.

Most importantly, avoid any behaviour that would make anyone (especially newer players) feel uncomfortable.

Peter's Lesson



It has been tremendous to see so many of you at the Tuesday afternoon Bridge Lab at LBC.

My lesson today is based on a comment I frequently hear.

Those Darn Reverses!

What is a reverse?

- > It is a sequence of bidding used by an opening bidder.
- It is meant to show a strong hand without making a jump bid.
- It is used when the opener has an unbalanced hand with 17+ points.
- The first bid suit is longer than the second bid suit.
- > The second bid suit is higher ranking than the first bid suit.

♠ 109♥ AKQJ♠ AJ♣ QJ 1098

Look at the first example on the left.

- 18 high card points
- 5 clubs and 4 hearts
- Game is a strong possibility.
- You open 1 club. Partner responds 1 spade. You then bid 2 hearts.
 Hearts rank higher than clubs. This shows a reverse and suggests that partner should consider game. It is the GAP bid. Even though partner showed that she likely doesn't have 4 hearts, you bid the gap suit (hearts) emphasizing your strong hand.



In the next example, you open 1 club. Partner responds 1 spade. Please bid 1 no trump. If you bid the gap bid of 2 hearts this time your partner will think you have at least 17 points and the bidding may get too high.
