




#### I Thought It Was a Sacrifice

South dealt and opened 1. I was West and with 5-5 distribution, I wanted into this auction. I tried 1. North showed her good hand with a 2 bid, and my partner raised me to 2. South competed with 3 and I bid 3. certain that North would go on in hearts. North did the expected, and 4 was passed back to me.



There was no doubt in my mind that 4♥ would make their way. I needed to decide whether or not to bid 4♠, hoping to hold my losses to six tricks. Down three doubled would cost only 500 compared to the 620 the opponents would get for making their game contract. My side five-card club suit convinced me that we had good chances of winning at least seven tricks, so I bid 4♠.

North doubled 4♠ and led the ♥A. I was quite happy with the dummy. We had three red losers off the top and two more possible losers in the black kings, so unless there was an ugly surprise, I thought, -300 should be a good result.

But none of the surprises on this hand turned out to be ugly. North continued with a second heart which I ruffed. I led a club to the queen, which won, then led the AQ, capturing South's king. Both black suits behaved so favourably that I was able to throw two of Dummy's diamonds on the last two clubs in my hand and ruff a diamond in Dummy, making an overtrick. Some sacrifice!

All of my careful analysis during the auction was wrong. The hand 'belonged' to the pair holding a combined 15 HCP. The pair with the 25 HCP and the nine-card heart fit wouldn't even make their game, having two losers in each black suit. Of course, if you switch the two black kings in the N/S hands, then N/S can make 5♥ and E/W will go down two in 4♠.

We look at our hands and listen to the auction and then we make our best guesses, but often they are just guesses.

For his bid, partner might have had a hand like: ♠Q742 ♥K54 ♦K53 ♣986. If that were his hand, I could find a way to lose seven tricks in 4♠ doubled. Perhaps three clubs, two diamonds, one heart and one spade. That would cost -800.

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#### Learning the Lingo – ENTRY


What in the world is an entry?

An entry is the way to access established cards in another suit in order to discard losers in your hand. This is important in both suit and NT contracts.

If you recall Allen Pengelly's article in the first "Learning the Lingo" column on September 14, he talked about establishing a suit. But what good is it to establish a suit if you have no way to get to your good cards?

It is crucial to plan your communication between your hand and dummy or, in other words, your transportation between the two hands. You must have a high card winner as an "entry" to the other hand in order to be able to enjoy the established suit.

Take this example in a NT contract.



Let's say that the A has been led. It is very important that you win the A at Trick 1 in your hand in order to preserve the K as your "entry" once the spades have been established.

# Dear David

#### **Points Schmoints**

I had two hands, both of which I got wrong. Can you help?

On the first hand, opener bid 1<sup>♠</sup> with five spades, 13 HCP, and a doubleton QJ of clubs. Without any interference, I responded 3<sup>♠</sup> with four-card support and 12 HCP. My partner then devalued his QJ of clubs and passed! Four spades, in retrospect, was a cinch! To be noted, with this partner I use Jacoby 2NT only if I have 13+ points and, of course, four-card support.

Sometimes you devalue your hand when you have an unsupported king in a suit that your lefthand opponent has bid. This is not the case here. A QJ combination is nice because of the touching honours. QJx is better. QJ10 is even better. AKQJ10 is even even better. The point is that it could always be better, but QJ opposite partner's AKxx would look nice.

When we first learned bridge, an important rule was "find your eight-card major suit fit". As above, a nine-card fit is often better and so is a 13-card fit. Stop looking for perfection! Play Jacoby with 3+. If you are unwilling to do that, make a 2/1 response to 1 (even in a four-card suit) and jump to game at your next turn to bid.

Here's a good rule. If your partner opens the bidding and you would have opened the bidding had you been the dealer, you must be in game. You will make a game most of the time. STOP COUNTING HIGH-CARD POINTS! They are an entry-level tool. A109 QJ10x KQ109 Q10 is only 14 HCP, but to open anything but 1NT with four tens and two nines is a mistake.

The second hand was basically the same scenario as described above, albeit complicated by interference from the opponents.

Nebulous jumps to 3<sup>+</sup> don't give partner anything to work with. You need to upgrade your communication skills. The way to show a limit raise or better after partner has overcalled is to cuebid the opponent's suit. If you bid 2<sup>+</sup>, partner will probably decide his hand isn't good enough and he will bid 2<sup>+</sup>. Are you done? No! You have a hand that you would have opened the bidding with. It deserves one more push. Bid 3<sup>+</sup>. Partner has a good suit, prime values (AK & Q) and a singleton. You must have an opener (2<sup>+</sup> is at least a limit raise and 3<sup>+</sup> shows even more). The North hand is worth a raise to 4<sup>+</sup>. 4<sup>+</sup> making five is a tie for a top score, all on a combined 21 HCP. STOP COUNTING HIGH-CARD POINTS!
