Simple Lebensohl Over Weak Twos

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Introduction

Lebensohl was originally invented in the late sixties for 1NT auctions. But forget about that for now – it's best used when partner doubles a weak two.

Problem

LHO	Partner	RHO	You
2♠	Double	Pass	??

After a weak two opening and a takeout double, partner is forced to bid at the 3 level. There is no room to show how weak or medium the hand is. For example: with four hearts, 3♥ must be bid even with zero points – in fact especially with zero points.

Solution - Simple Lebensohl

Lebensohl is used to provide a better indication of the strength of the responder to the doubler.

After 2 - Dbl - P - ??:

- With 0-7 points, you bid Lebensohl 2NT which forces a relay of 3♣
 - This is either passed or corrected to the best suit (4+ cards)
- With 8-11 points, suits are bid at the 3 level invitational 4+ cards, non-forcing
- With 12+ points, game is on and there are three main options:
 - Cue bid the oppo's suit forcing to game
 - Imagine this is a bit like Stayman and FSF combined
 - Guarantees four cards in the other major (or very strong)
 - With a five card major or six card minor go straight to game
 - 3NT is to play
 - Includes a good stop in oppo's suit and denies four of the other major
 - This is known as FASS Fast Approach Shows Stop (natural style)
 - [Advanced players prefer FADS Fast Approach Denies Stop]

If they opened 2♥ (or 2♦) then there is the extra option to bid spades (or hearts) at the 2 level – this is a natural weak suit, no need to bid Lebensohl 2NT.

After $2 \checkmark - Dbl - P - ??$ and you have four (or more) spades:

- With 0-7 points bid 2♠
- All other bids are the same as before for example, 8-11 points bid 3♠
 - o Note Wikipedia article has a more complicated system

With a super strong hand the doubler can choose not to bid 3♣ after Lebensohl 2NT.

What if partner doubles in fourth seat?

LHO	Partner	RHO	You
		2♠	Pass
Pass	Double	Pass	??

Keep it simple - Lebensohl works exactly the same.

How to remember all these point ranges?

Let's compare with when partner doubles at the one level.

- With 0-7 points, bid cheapest natural suit e.g. 2♥
 - o Partner must pass, unless they've got nearly "half the deck"
- With 8-11 points, jump bid invitational 4+ cards, non-forcing e.g. 3♥
 - o Remember only shows a four card suit at this stage
- With 12+ points game is on and usually cue bid the oppo's suit e.g. 2♠

Simple Lebensohl follows a very similar pattern – good consistency.

For the Future

Once you're comfortable using Lebensohl over weak twos, you can consider using it in other similar cases when partner forces you to bid over other weak 2-level bids:

• Weak Jump Overcalls where opener makes a re-opening double:

LHO	Partner	RHO	You	
	1♣	2♠	Pass	
Pass	Double	Pass	??	

This is almost exactly the same as a weak 2 opener. Normally a re-opening double at this level should be showing extra values (upper teens) – if Lebensohl is available then opener can re-open double with slightly less (lower teens) – knowing that a weak responder can bid 2NT Lebensohl to duck out at the three level.

• When oppos make a **very weak doubled major raise** and partner doubles a second time in the protective (fourth) seat:

LHO	Partner	RHO	You
1♠	Double	2♠	Pass
Pass	Double	Pass	??

We're in the same situation as if they have opened a weak 2 – so Lebensohl applies. Just like the previous case, normally a second double at this level should be showing extra values (upper teens) – Lebensohl enables opener to double again with slightly less (lower teens).

• When the oppos make a **very weak major raise** (you know that they play quite aggressively) and partner doubles with their first bid:

LHO	Partner	RHO	You	
		1♠	Pass	
2♠	Double	Pass	??	

Again we're in the same situation as if they have opened a weak 2 – so Lebensohl applies. If the oppos only have 15-16 points between them, then we're close to game and partner wants to find out how close.
